

31 Marlborough Buildings – The Story of this remarkable Building and its Owners from 1770 to date.

Introduction

Paul and Daria Mattingly were to purchase no. 31 Marlborough Buildings in May 2022 from the then owners Mario and Jeanette Cicirello, whose family had owned it since 1959. During their residency it had been split into a number of apartments that they let to tenants. Paul and Daria then set themselves the task of restoring the building to how it would have originally looked in Georgian times. With Paul's father's help they researched the history of the building through books and documents in the record office as far as they could. They were fortunate in being given the original set of deeds dating back to its construction in 1790. It has now been possible to compile a comprehensive record of the owners and occupiers of no. 31 Marlborough Buildings in this booklet. There follows a detailed listing of these and key events in its history.

Marlborough Buildings is often overlooked by visitors to Bath by its impressive neighbour - The Royal Crescent, which is a shame as its appearance and position is just as impressive. It was John Wood Senior (1704-1754) who became famous for a number of works which included St. John's Hospital, Queens Square, the Royal Mineral Hospital, the North and South Parades and the Circus. He died before the completion of the latter and it was his son also called John Wood who was to complete it and go on to design the Assembly Rooms, Brock Street and finally the Royal Crescent which was finished in 1775. Sadly when he died in 1782, aged just 54, he was deeply in debt, partly due to financial conditions relating to his fathers earlier building speculations. It was his wife, Mary and their daughter, Elizabeth who was married to the Rev. James Tomlinson who were to inherit his debts and few assets. Her husband had built the Royal Crescent on land that he had leased from Sir Peter Rivers Gay on an original ground rent of £220. He would have continued with his designs for terraces on the remainder of this land. Unfortunately, no designs have survived of what he intended to construct on it. On January 12th 1786, there was a large Auction of his former properties which included lot 7 which was described as "a freehold site being west of the Royal Crescent", which was eventually to be the site of Marlborough Buildings. An advert in the Bath Chronicle at the time describes it as a vacant piece of ground intended and planned for building houses. It describes a small house lately erected at the north end. This had already been built by Jeremiah Chivers and is today the Marlborough Tavern. The lot reached an auction price of £1970 and was bought by the builder John Fielder with his associates, James Broom, Thomas King and William Cross.it was to be John Fielder who often describes himself as an architect who was to design most of the 33 houses that were to be built on the site in due course. Although nos. 13 to 15 are attributed to John Palmer, based on an identical frontage to bee seen on those on the west side of Green Park Buildings designed by him. It is astonishing to think that within just 3 years by 1790 the terrace was to be built and finished. John Fielder and his associates divided the long strip of ground which was not guite an acre into a number of plots on which they charged ground rents of between 9s and 12s 6d per foot, which equated to between £9 and £12 a property. They themselves had then to pay the owner of the plot - the Rivers Estate an annual rent of £220 that had been agreed with John Wood the younger in 1766.

John Fielder himself was one of the many builders and craftsmen who took on the leases and constructed the terrace. To finance this they would borrow from the bank or wealthy individuals. They in turn would sell them on completion to clear their debts and no doubt move on to the next one. At the rear of the row of houses were the Commons which at that time were fields. Although many architects had planned to build on them, they were never successful and it remains virtually unspoilt today with allotment and Victoria Park replacing them. The early deeds that have come down to us for no. 31 Marlborough Buildings allow us to have an insight into how it was constructed. The initial document is dated 5th February 1788 and is the contract between Mark Fowles, the builder and John Fielder and his partners. Mark is described as a Tiler and Plasterer who was to have to pay a perpetual rent of £9.18s to them. It is very descriptive and explains exactly how it is to be built, although there was an opportunity to alter its interior. It has been difficult to find records relating to Mark apart from the fact at that time he was living nearby at 42 Rivers Street before moving to Murford Street. Fortunately, there are some early deeds with his signature on them. These relate to a mortgage for £600 that he received from Miss Mary Ann Rooper on the 12th January 1790 to finance the project. Tragically he was never to see the completion as the next record we have for him is his burial at St. Swithins Church in June 1791. Miss Rooper herself was to die just 2 years later.

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No.31 would have been completed by 22nd March 1792 as this was the date on the deed for its sale to Sir George Colebrooke by the trustees, John George and Richard Hewlett. Sir George would have been aged 63 at that time and was living with his wife, Mary and some of their children at the new built house. They had moved just a short distance from the Royal Crescent which had been their home for a number of years. Sir George's life has been well documented in an article called the "Shah of Alum" by Stuart Boydell which can be found on the historyofbath website. It would seem that he had been an English banker, member of parliament for Arundel and chairman of the East India Company before settling in Bath. His speculations had caused him to lose a fortune and escape to France. On his return he endeavoured to pay off all his debts, which he had succeeded by the time of his death in 1809. During his familes long period of residency at no. 31 he was very active in the life of Bath and his name appears regularly in the pages of the Bath Chronicle. Again, the deeds to the house are useful in that they give an insight into his life there. He was to pay Mark Fowles trustees £1225 for the property and take out a £900 mortgage with the Rev. Charles Daubeny to finance it. This gentleman is famous as being the first minister at the nearby Christ Church which he helped finance. The mortgage was only to be for a year as he later increased it to £1600, which he borrowed from the wealthy Woollen Draper, Arthur Jones. A deed for 1802 shows Sir George transferring the house to his eldest son, George who was residing at Woodlands in Lyndhurst at that time. After her husbands death in 1809, Lady Colebrooke continued to live at no. 31 until her own death in 1818 and was buried in the family mausoleum in Chilham Church, their ancestral seat. Until we received the deeds to the house, we were completely unaware of the next owner and assumed it was his tenant, Samuel Lane. They showed that Hastings Elwin had paid £1775 for no. 31 from the surviving trustees to Sir George who were his sons James and Henry Colebrooke. There is a marvellous article on Hastings Elwin in the Geological Curator for December 2005 which is online. He was a founding member of the Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institution in 1825. Their building still stands today in Queens Square and provides a venue for a number of exhibitions and talks during the year. It is there that you can see a bust of the gentleman. Although Hastings Elwin may never have lived at no.31 he did reside nearby in St. james Square and rented the house to Samuel Lane and his family. This gentleman would have already been renting the house when he moved in shortly after the death of Lady Colebrooke in 1818. He would have been aged 69 in that year after a successful career as Collector of Taxes for Kings Lynn. Married to Elizabeth Mathew, they were to have 6 children, the most famous of whom was also named Samuel. He was to become a popular portrait artist and a number of those of his family can be seen in the Town Hall in Kings Lynn today. The Lane family were to reside at no.31 for the next 10 years before returning to King's Lynn where Samuel was to died in 1835 aged 86. There now follows a long chapter of ownership when in 1830 a rich widow buys the house. It is in that year that Mrs. Mary Marlow pays £1700 to Hastings Elwin for no.31. She was the widow of Michael Marlow, who had died in 1828, aged 71. He had been president of St.

He had been president of St. John's College and Vice Chancellor of Oxford University as well as a Canon of Canterbury. They were to have no children and the 1841 Census for the house show her living in the large property, aged 60, with just 3 servants. She was to continue to reside there until her death in 1848, when the house and contents were auctioned. An advert in the Bath Chronicle describes in detail the contents of each room.

The story of the house now becomes really interesting with the next owner of the house. The successful bidder at the auction on March 14th, 1848 is Mrs. Anna Bourne. She is in fact a daughter of Samuel Lane who had lived there previously. It seems that she was living at the Circus in Bath in the year 1835, when her wealthy husband died in his 64th year and was buried in the Abbey, where there is a marble memorial to him. She pays just £1050, a drop of £700 on the price paid by Mrs Mary Jane Marlow in 1830. The census returns for 1851 and 1861 again show her residing in the large house similar to her predecessor with just 4 servants for company. She was to live to a good age of 83 before dying in 1869 and being buried in a fine tomb at the Church in Priston. There was to be a large auction of both the house and contents on February 10th whose description appeared as an advert in the Bath Chronicle.

Introduction

The successful bidder at the auction was local solicitor, Henry Holland Burne who paid £1300 to the trustees, Mrs Harriett Hammond (sister) and Frederick William Lane (brother). We are fortunate that an early photograph can be found in the collection of the National Portrait Gallery. Again, it was not until the deeds were studied for no.31 Marlborough Buildings that it could be seen that he and his trustees were the owners from 1848 until 1931. He in fact was to only reside there for 20 years. In 1890 he bought both 27 and 28 Marlborough Buildings, which were a short distance away and rented no. 31. He then instructed the architects, Browne and Gill to design three storey extensions on all three properties which still can be seen today. He played a very important part in the life of Bath during his life and reached the good old age of 81 before his death in 1911. He was extremely wealthy and left an estate of £215,000 - a considerable amount for those times.

The house was to be let for a number of years to a series of wealthy tenants. The first of these was in 1891 when Mrs Catherine Charlewood moved in with her daughter Mrs. Catherine Caldecot. Both were widows and the 1891 and 1901 Censuses shows them there with their Cook, Maid, Housemaid and Parlour Maid. It is on the death of the mother in 1904, aged 84, that the house is put up for sale. The lease is eventually bought by Colonel Charles Webster. The 1911 Census described him as retired aged 73 with his wife Mary who is 26 years his junior with their four servants. His wife continued to live at the address after his death in 1916 for a couple of years until her own death in 1918.

The house was again advertised with its contents in the Bath Chronicle on the 12th February of that year and sold to another widow, Mrs Emily Grafton and her daughter, Lilian. Her late husband, Frederick, had been a wealthy industrialist from Accrington where he had a Calico Factory. The 1921 Census described her as aged 90 living with her daughter, Lilian, aged 59 and 5 servants. She was to die three years later and her daughter was to live on until 1936.

It was May Butterworth who was to pay just £750 for no. 31 Marlborough Buildings in 1931. It was sold by Henry Burnes trustees who were Richard Higgins Burne and Ernest Wallace Rooke. May was living at 11 Miles Buildings at the time of the sale. The Street had gone into decline and the days of the wealthy residents had disappeared and been replaced with multiple occupants. The directories showed that a number of properties were completely empty. May only lived there for 5 years and was then bought for just £500 by John Charles Richardson who was there briefly and sold it in 1937 to Joseph Matthews for £650 who described himself as a Dairyman living at 79 Wells Road in Bath on the contract. He had a number of properties which he rented out. Judging from newspaper reports on various court cases that he was a ruthless landlord with his tenants. Directories show the house was split into a number of apartments. Bath was badly bombed during the war and the house received some damage. There is a letter in the archives that reveals that Joseph Matthews had claimed £125 for war damage.

In 1959 the house was bought by Giuseppe Cicerello and Domenico Toto from Joseph Matthews.

Domenico Toto the following year sold his interest for £385 to his relation Giuseppe Cicirello, who was already living in part of it. The Bath Record Office has a copy of the plans submitted in 1962 by Giuseppe for alterations to the rear of the building. He was born in Sicily in 1909 and was married to Angela Toto. He continued to let part of the property and this which was continued by his son Mario after his death in 1981, aged 72.

Finaly in 2022 the house was offered for sale by the Cicirello family after over 60 years of ownership and bought by Paul and Daria Mattingly and their family.

This booklet can only cover a fraction of the fascinating history of no.31 and as more information comes to light it will be updated and added to the freshford.com website page. Neil Mattingly.



The site of Marlborough Buildings was originally a field known as the "Hayes Furlong" which formed a part of Barton Farm. On 16 June 1699, William Saunders sold the Manor and Rectory of Walcot, except Barton Farm to Robert Gay, surgeon, of London. This gentleman had married his daughter, Mary. In the early eighteenth century, Robert Gay had apparently also come into possession of Barton Farm, probably by virtue of his wife's inheritance. When Robert Gay died in 1737, he left the Bath property to his daughter Margaret, by his second wife. She died without issue in 1765 and left the estate to her brother-in-law, Sir Benet Garrard who, in 1767, bequeathed all his Bath estate to Sir Peter Rivers, who took the name of Gay.

It was on the fields of Barton Farm that John Wood Senior was to design many of his famous buildings including Queens Square and The Circus. It's strange today to think that the original farm house now forms part of the rear of Jolly's department Store in Milsom Street (see photos in 1850 and today).

John Wood Senior was to die in 1754, aged just 50, with his work on the Circus unfinished. It was his son, John Wood the Younger who was to complete this by 1768. The conveyance of the ground was granted to Wood and Thomas Brock, his trustee, by the landlord, Sir Benet Garrard, in December, 1766, at a ground rent of £220 per annum. Work on the Royal Crescent commenced early in 1767

Several individual contractors and craftsmen worked independently on the houses. Wood engaged them to carry out uniform exteriors, according to his plans, but gave them freedom to alter interiors to suit individual tenants. The builders, having arranged with tenants to lease the houses for a term of years, then took their agreements to the bank, and had no difficulty in obtaining money to commence work.

He no doubt planned building on the site. Unfortunately, by the time of his death in 1782, aged just 54, he was terribly in debt and the site was left to his wife, Mary. A Deed in the Bath Record Office shows that in January 1786 she had been released of the original ground rent of \pounds 220 from Sir Peter Rivers Gay.

There was an auction of her husband`s former properties on January 17 1787, where the site of Marlborough Buildings was later described as:

`Lott 7, a freehold site being west of the Royal Crescent'

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The Auction in January 1786 of the Land on which Marlborough Buildings was to built within just four years.

The Bath Chronicle, 12 January 1786 had an advert for a number of properties that were being auctioned amongst them was lot VII shown on the right. This was to be the piece of ground that Marlborough Buildings was to go up on. It is very descriptive of the land as follows: "The inheritance in fee on all that vacant piece of land intended and planned for building houses and for a street called Milk Street lying on the westward side of the Crescent and next to the grounds called Town Commons, being very pleasantly situated and desirable for the intended purpose together with clear ground rent in fee of £3.00 per annum payable quarterly and charged on a small house erected on the north of the said vacant ground". The small House was known as Chivers and was to eventually be renamed "The Marlborough Tavern". It reached an auction price of £1970 and was bought by John Fielder, James Broom, Thomas King and William Cross. The beneficiary was Mary Wood's daughter, Elizabeth who was married to Rev. James Tomlinson, Rector of Davenham in Cheshire.



John Fielder and his partners purchase the plot of land in 1786 and start soon after building Marlborough Buildings on the site.

This watercolour by Thomas Mallon painted in 1769 allows us to glimpse workman in the foreground finishing the blocks of Bath Stone which would have also been used later in 1788 for the construction of Marlborough Buildings. John Fielder was to pay £1970 for nearly an acre of ground in January 1786 on which were to be built a terrace of 34 houses. He was in partnership with James Broom, Thomas King and William Cross who were wealthy Bath tradesmen. A number of deeds have survived for some of the properties in Bath Record Office. The original indentures are very descriptive of how the work was to be carried out and are listed in number order from the first house that was built for Mr. Chivers (now Marlborough Tavern) in 1785. Some of them may well have been designed by John Fielder who some often described himself as an architect as well as Builder, Tiler and Plasterer. Though nos. 13,14,15 have been attributed to Thomas Baldwin. It is astonishing that the Terrace was completed in the space of three years by 1790. Some of the houses were kept by the builders and the remainder sold on to wealthy citizens. John Fielder and his partners charged annual ground rents between £9 and £12, which showed a healthy profit on their original investment. Although they were to continue to pay to the Rivers Estate the £220 annual rent agreed with John Wood the Younger in 1766.







At the rear of Marlborough Buildings is a large unspoilt area known as the Bath Common which has survived development over the centuries and now forms part of Victoria Park, Bath Approach Golf Course, Allotments. It was formerly part of the larger Walcot Estate and was owned by the Freemen of Bath. The early maps shown here reveal how little it has changed over the years. It is now administered by Bath City Council.



A Plan of the Estate of the Freemen of the City of Bath in 1875




A Plan of the Bath Common in 1829




Aerial view of the Common in 2022

Higher up is the Royal Crescent, a majestic assemblage of buildings of an elliptical form, with a single order of Ionic pillars, supporting the lower cornice. It consists of thirty elegant houses, with a fine lawn in front, declining towards the Avon, and commands a very extensive prospect over the city and the opposite hills. By the west end of this Crescent runs that beautiful and airy pile called Marlborough Buildings. **A Guide to all the Watering Places; (1803) by R Phillips**

The circumstances of his marriage, too, were found to admit of much extenuation. 

" The speculative boom still in its infancy? We hear with pleasure that Mr.Symons has let the ground for twenty-seven houses in Camden-place [later Camden Crescent], and that Mr.Spackman has nearly let the whole ground that is to form the New Crescent [Lansdown Crescent]. A very grand plan, we also learn, is drawn of new streets, a circus, and square, to be built in Bathwick meadows; which for elegance and convenience will at least equal any buildings in this city. A range of 30 capital houses {Marlborough Buildings] is also erecting west of the [Royal] Crescent. // Bath, as a city, is certainly only in its infancy; for being a central point, abounding with all the luxuries of life, all the amusements for the gay, or the rational society for the aged, and healing waters for the deceased [i.e. diseased], who can wonder that all the opulent, who are not obliged to reside part of the year in London, should prefer such a residence; or that single gentlemen or ladies of small fortunes should retire to such a place, where they may live as reasonable as in a village in Yorkshire?" **Bath Chronicle 8 Mar 1787**

John Wood the Younger: The demand for houses was great and was increasing: more and more visitors were coming to Bath, ready and anxious to take a house for the season. What simpler than to create a longer street in a fashionable area that was growing so rapidly? He had another, and more significant reason, however, for lengthening Brock Street. At the western end of the street there was a large plot of gently sloping ground adjoining the Common. Wood saw this as the perfect site for an ambitious plan that had been exercising his mind for some time – a plan that involved the design and erection of a great crescent of houses in the Palladian style. Because the Common could never be built upon, his new houses would have an uninterrupted outlook down to the Bristol road and beyond; and they would very conveniently be linked to the Circus by an extended Brock Street. So, with the scheme taking shape in his mind, Wood designed the houses m' Brock Street with modest facades. Nothing grandiose, he argued, should distract people as they approached the new crescent; a gentle stroll from the Circus along a dignified, but unremarkable street – and then the breathtaking View of his Palladian master- piece would explode before their eyes. It was a masterly conception; and it is as valid today as it was more than two hundred years ago. The conveyance of the ground was granted to Wood and Thomas Brock, his trustee, by the landlord, Sir' Benet Garrard, in December, 1766, at a ground rent of €200 per annum. Work commenced early in 1767 and, as we have seen, the foundation stone of the first house was laid in May of that year. Several individual contractors and craftsmen worked independently on the houses. The conditions under which they were employed were simple and effective. Wood engaged them to carry out uniform exteriors, according to his plans, but gave them freedom to alter interiors to suit individual tenants. The builders, having arranged with tenants to lease the houses for a term of years, then took their agreements

Returning to Marlborough Lane and heading N uphill, the long terrace of Marlborough Buldings brings urban Bath to an abrupt end. The development, on the w side only, was promoted by a tiler, plasterer and a statuary mason on land obtained in 1787. The houses are plain with unadorned arched doorways, a characteristic motif of the ending C18, except for the much more elaborate central trio, Nos. 13–15. They mark the end of the vista from Brock Street across the front of the Royal Crescent. Their central first-floor Windows have pediments set in shallow arches with decorative panels either side (cf. Nos. 28–30 Green Park by Palmer — see Walk 11, p. 251). The larger rooms, at the back, over- look the view, with the staircase to the front. Originally identical, many at the N end have C19 bathroom and porch excrescences: Nos. 17–18, porches by Hayward of Wooster, 1885–7; Nos. 22 and 27, porches by F. W. Gardiner, 1905 and 1910; No. 25, a full—height extension with a French mansard roof by W. E. Tovey, builders, 1885.


Early Maps of Marlborough Buildings

John Fielder and his partners who built Marlborough Buildings are listed in the Bath Directory in 1792

William Gye printed a series of Directories annually for Bath which provide valuable information on the inhabitants and their residences. The one for 1792 is especially important in locating the individuals whose names appear with John Fielder as partners when he bought the land on which Marlborough buildings was to be later built. I have abstracted those applicable below with their trade and residence in that year. I have also added their various signatures which appear on most of the early indentures for Marlborough Buildings. Although many are described as Builders, they in fact ran successful specialist businesses which I hope to show in the following pages.



A Plan of the ground floor of no. 16 Marlborough Buildings as it would have appeared soon after being built c.1790



John Fielder – The Builder who purchased the Land on which Marlborough Buildings was built on.

John Fielder is the gentleman who purchased the strip of land at the Auction in 1786 for £1970 on which Marlborough buildings was to rise up in just a couple of years. He was a successful Builder who had already been involved with a number of sites and was to in time behind the development of St. James Square. He was born in Bath in 1737 and was to later marry Elizabeth Kempster in 1765. She was to later die and he remarried Ann Shaw in 1783. He first appears as a Plasterer in an advert for an Auction of six houses in Bath. The Rates for River Street show him renting out four houses. He lives and runs his business from no. 1 in this street which is the first house on the left in the Pen and ink drawing by James Blackamore in 1774. The house is still standing as is seen in the photograph on the right.






Rivers Street in 1776 by James Blackamore


John Fielder – The Builder who purchased the Land on which Marlborough Buildings was built on.

In March 1790 Sir Peter Rivers Gay, Lord of the Manor of Walcot granted to Richard Hewlett and James Broom a 99 years building lease of some land to the north of the Royal Crescent, beyond the road then known as Cottle's Lane. This land consisted of orchards and gardens which at the time were tenanted by various residents of the Crescent. The lease was granted to Hewlett and Broom on the condition that they would spend at least £10,000 "in erecting buildings and finishing stone messuages", and they engaged John Palmer to design the layout and elevations for a residential square with four tributary streets. Building was begun as soon as the site could be cleared, and most of the houses were completed by 1794. John Fielder and Thomas King were among the builders associated with the project. Marlborough Street forms one of the four diagonal approaches to St James's Square



He is one of the partners who purchase the original plot of land with John Fielder fir £1975. He is described as a Carpenter in these deeds living in Walcot. We can be more precise with his address thanks to the Bath Directory of 1792 which shows him as a Carpenter and Builder living at no.9 Belvedere in Bath. The 1790 Rates book show him selling no. 14 to John Boissir. He is also the builder of no. 27 and leaves it to his wife, Betty on his death who sells it in 1793 to Davis Mill for £1480. He with Richard Hewlett in 1790 takes out a 99 year lease from Sir Peter Rivers Gay for a piece of land which they build a number of houses in St. James`s Square. His extensive Will shows him owning a number of properties in Bath and it is his son, James who carries on his trade a builder.




Thomas King – Statuary Walcot

Thomas King`s name appears on all the indentures that were drawn up for the various Builders who worked on the 34 houses that were to form Marlborough buildings. He is one of the partners who purchase the original plot of land with John Fielder fir £1975. He is described as a Statuary Mason living in Walcot. He was the leading marble mason in Bath in the second half of the eighteenth century, advertised his prices in the Bath Chronicle in 1786. Advertisements including reference to chimney pieces and other materials for the building trade show the importance of that market to marble masons' businesses. Tablets would have been cheaper than monuments but still relatively expensive for most families. By his death in 1804 he had amassed a considerable property portfolio including houses in St. James Square, Dover Street, Bennet Street, Mount Pleasant, Paragon, and Beaufort Place, Walcot where he died leaving a substantial estate to his sons who continued the business. In his will he provided £20 for a monument to himself duly executed by his sons in Woolley church on the outskirts of Bath.




The most striking feature is that two firms, the Kings and the Reeves, produced 210 or 64%. Only 6 firms produced more than 10 works and the other 19 produced only 49 or 15%. The latter group comprise some who were primarily professional sculptors producing a memorial only occasionally, some who were more involved in the building trade as builder, supplier or architect and some whose career was short or low in signed works. The Kings and the Reeves were outstandingly successful in memorial marble work with the Biggs and Lancashires providing competition in the heyday of the trade.



n 'The Georgian Buildings of Bath', Walter Ison comments that no architect has been named in connection with the design of the elevations but the first houses to be built, Nos 13-15, bear all the hallmarks of John Palmer . No. 28 - 30 Green Park by Palmer An elegant, riverside area, Green Park was originally designed by the architect John Palmer in 1792.



1799 marked the beginning of the site which we now know as Green Park. Begun by city architect were John Palmer and completed by the elder John Pinch in 1808. It must have been an attractive development, with two rows of houses looking onto a pleasant green and surrounded by mature trees. Sadly, the east side was destroyed as a result of the air raids in 1942. Although the west side known as Green Park Buildings still remains, it's appearance seems somewhat isolated, which not surprising when you realize that half the original development no longer exists.



We are very fortunate in that the original contract between John Fielder and his partners has survived and the builder, Mark Fowles for 31 Marlborough Buildings. It is very detailed and is almost identical to those that were issued to the builders of the other houses in the Terrace. It is very descriptive of how it is to be built and supplies us with a wealth of information about what it was intended to look like when finished. It is dated 5th February 1788 and is a contract between Mark and John Fielder and is partners. John is described as a Tiler and Plasterer and his partners : James Broom a Carpenter, Thomas King who produces Statuary, William Cross a Upholsterer. John's son Charles Fielder is a trustee with Mark Fowles. The Indenture outlines the history of the plot of ground formerly part of a field known as Hayes Furlong owned by the trustees of John Wood the younger. It was formerly called Milk Lane, but now Marlborough Buildings. It was bounded at the rear by Bath Common belonging to the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the said City. On the south were premises (30)that William Cross had since sold to Charles Viner on which he was building a house. On the north was a house (32)being built by Richard Hewlett. It is shown to be the fourth house from the corner house belonging to Jeremiah Chivers (now Marlborough Tavern). Mark has to pay a perpetual farm rent of £9 18/- from the 24th June 1789 to John Fielder and his partners and their heirs. He was to have to build at his own cost in a substantial manner and with sound and good materials and complete the whole and every part of the building. There then follows details of the way it was to built in great depth including a share of the common sewer. It also covered his insurance and rebuilding if lost in a fire. He and his heirs were not to carry out a great long list of trades including Currier, Blacksmith, Butcher and Victualler.

The long document is signed at the bottom by John Fielder, Thomas King, James Broom, William Cross, Charles Fielder and Mark Fowles in the presence of James Deverell and John Physick, clerks to Mr. Jefferys, Bath

This Indenture made the 5th February 1788 between John Fielder of the City of Bath, Tiler and Plasterer, James Broom of the parish of Walcot, Carpenter, and Thomas King of Parish of Walcot, Statuary of the 1st Part. Mark Fowles is clearly shown as the builder of 31 Marlborough Buildings from the original contract of February 1788. There is very little information relating to him and his family that has been located. The 1792 Bath Directory is helpful as it shows his family living at 42 Rivers Street which is run as a Lodging House. The 1781 Rates confirm this and that he with his brother, Daniel live in the Street. This is also the Street where John Fielder and his partner, Charles Fielder live and is only a short distance from Marlborough Buildings. It would appear that shortly after completion of the house in 1790 he was to die the following year and was buried at St. Swithins church in Walcot. There is an interesting advert on the 28th July of that year requiring those who have debts with him and his nephew, Thomas to contact Richard Hewlett with their accounts. It was Richard Hewlett who built no. 32 Marlborough buildings at the same time.

Mark Fowles was one of a number of skilled craftsmen who would build complete houses during the late 18th century boom in Bath. The outside followed a plan designed by the Architect and the inside allowed more freedom, although most floor plans had the same layout. He was described as a Plasterer and Tiler on the deeds that have survived with the house. In 1788 he signed a contract to the design of John Fielder who had earlier bought the land that the 31 houses were to be built on. To complete the construction, he borrowed £600 from Miss Mary Ann Rooper the following year and agrees to pay her 5% interest on the loan. Mary Ann came from a wealthy family who at that time were living in Brock Street in Bath. They had originated from Berkhampstead in Hertfordshire where they had owned the Castle. Her father, Godolphin Rooper died in 1790, aged 81 and her mother, Mary passed away in January 1793, leaving their daughter a considerable fortune. Tragically, Mary Ann was to survive her mother for only 4 months, before dying herself in May, aged just 41.

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

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
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Colebrooke was born in 1729 at Chilham, Kent, the third son of James Colebrooke, a London banker, and was educated at Leiden University. banker and speculator and slave-owner in Antigua and elsewhere in the Caribbean, Husband of Mary Gaynor, daughter and heir of Peter Gaynor (d. 1738); Sir George Colebrooke is shown as having inherited £200,000 from his father-in-law, but presumably the property in fact was Mary Gaynor's until her marriage. Their second son Sir James Edward Colebrooke (q.v.) succeeded his father in 1809 after the death of both Sir George Colebrooke and their eldest son that year. He was MP for Arundel 1754-1774, and Chairman of the East India Co. His bank closed its doors in 1773 and he was bankrupted in 1777 after loses including £190,000 in speculation on hemp, but appears to have recovered some of his property before his death in 1809.

After the death of his father and an older brother, George was left in sole charge of the family bank in Threadneedle Street, and invested some of his wealth in buying up control of the borough of Arundel in Susse, where the family lived. Colebrooke kept control for twenty years, sitting himself as M.P. from 1754 to 1774 and for most of the period being able to choose also who held the other seat. Meanwhile, his brother, James had bought control of one seat in another rotten borough, Gatton in Surrey for £23,000, and was also sitting in Parliament.

Both brothers were at first Opposition Whigs,, but switched support to the Duke of Newcastle's government and were rewarded in 1759 with the creation of a baronetcy for James (who had daughters but no son) and a special remainder of the baronetcy to George. When James died in 1761, George inherited both the baronetcy, Gatton Park and the Lordship of the Manor at Gatton with its guaranteed control of one of the parliamentary seats there. He had Gatton Park landscaped by Capability Brown between 1762 and 1768. More valuably, however, Colebrooke's support for Newcastle ensured his eligibility for lucrative government contracts. By 1762, he held two of these contracts, one for remitting money to the British forces in the American colonies and the other for victualling the troops there. But with Newcastle's fall from power in that year, Colebrooke was immediately ejected from one contract by the new government, and the other was not

renewed when it expired in 1765. Though offered compensation or new contracts on the formation of the Rockingham government, he preferred instead to accept a well-paid post as Chirographer to the Court of Common Pleas.. From this point onwards although he retained his seat in Parliament he was rarely active there.

Colebrooke's business interests were diverse. He speculated in land, buying large estates in Lanarkshire, and purchased plantations in Antigua (where his wife already had interests),Grenada and Dominica and was a slave-owner, he was also a member of a syndicate to settle the Ohio Valley in in 1768, and had interests in New England.(Colebrook, New Hampshire is named in his honour.) Two interests in particular, however, led to his eventual downfall: his involvement in the East India Company and his speculations in raw materials. Colebrooke was a Director of the East India Company from 1767 to 1771, Deputy Chairman 1768-69 and was elected Chairman three times, in 1769, 1770 and 1772. His final year in office was a disastrous one: the company got into financial difficulties (which led to the passing of the Regulating Act of 1773), he was accused of speculating in its stock while Chairman, and was left heavily in debt to a number of the other leading figures in the company, partly through arrangements to procure votes in the company's elections. He lost much larger sums, however, speculating on prices of raw materials – hemp, flax, lead, logwood and alum among others. In 1771 he lost £190,000 dealing in hemp; from 1772 he was attempting to corner the world's supply of alum, buying up mines in Yorkshire and Lancashire, and saw much of the remainder of

his fortune swallowed up when the market collapsed as part of a wider financial crisis. At first, Colebrooke was able to stay in business with assistance from the Bank of England, but his bank temporarily stopped payment on 31 March 1773, and permanently (after three years in the control of trustees appointed by his creditors) on 7 August 1776. Yet at the same period he was spending considerable sums on the rebuilding of his London house in Soho Square. Most of his property, including his share in the rotten borough at Gatton, was sold to meet his liabilities, and a commission of bankruptcy was taken out against him in 1777. He retired to Boulogne- sur-Mer, so poor that the East India Company had to vote him a pension, but later returned to England and managed

eventually to pay his creditors in full so that some inheritance was left for his descendants. He died in Bath on 5 August 1809. He had married Mary Gayner, daughter of Peter Gayner of Antigua, in 1754, and they had three sons and three daughters: Mary Colebrooke (born 1757), George Colebrooke (1759–1809), James Edward Colebrooke(1761–1838), who succeeded to the baronetcy, Harriet Colebrooke (1762–1785), Louisa Colebrooke (born 1764), Professor Henry Thomas Colebrooke (1765–1837)





The Colebrookes were installed in their new home at 31 Marlborough Buildings in Bath by October 1791). Sir George quickly established himself as a member of the Bath artistic and literary elite, who included a number of former connections from his time in London, most notably, Mrs Hester Piozzi (formerly Mrs Thrale) of 8 Gay Street who, given their long-established friendship, would have ensured the Colebrookes' entrée into Bath society. During his years in France, he was involved with a Masonic Lodge that is reported to have had an international membership Sir George's presence in Bath's society directed his actions beyond religious affairs to include chairing a number of leading civic bodies within the city. Sir George was involved with an association of residents who created a charitable organisation offering assistance to the poor. The organisation entitled 'The Society for the Suppression of Vagrants, Relief of Occasional Distress' began functioning in January 1805.In January 1801, the newly created Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institution had plans to establish a 'Bath Publick Library of learned books not usually found in circulating libraries or private collections. The man nominated for the role of president of the proposed library was Sir George. Unfortunately, the plans never came to fruition due to the falling numbers of wealthy permanent and visiting residents in Bath who could make the venture viable. On 4th August 1809, the man who it was said had the chance to be the richest man in the country died at the age of eighty. His obituary in the Bath Chronicle, and repeated in newspapers all over the country, chose to summarise his life by his actions that led to his financial ruin: 'At Bath Easton, 30 Bath Chronicle (3rd December 1807), Sir George Colebrooke, Bart, formerly a merchant and broker in London of the first eminence and most extensive dealings; but his commercial concerns were ruined by an avaricious speculation in alum.. Sir George was a fighter and a survivor, and this is clearly illustrated from the immediate aftermath of his bankruptcy. Sir George was interred in his family vault at St Mary's parish church in Chilham in Kent along with his wife, parents, and those children who predeceased him. Sir James Colebrooke and his family are also interred within the vault. Robert Colebrooke was buried in France. An extract from the "Shah of Alum" by Stuart Boydell



After the Ladies had been alarmed, Mrs. Taaf got into the carriage, and Mr. Boltby mounted the box They then drove to the Albany Chambers, where Mrs. Taafe Solicitor came, and the parties separated. The Defendant admitted they were guilty, and a verdict was taken accordingly

Mr. GURNEY moved the judgment of the Court only on Mr Bolthy and Parish, the prize-fighter. He did not bring up Mrs. Tanfe.

Mr. Boltby put in his affidavit, stating that he was a mer chant in Duke-street, Adclphi. He represented that he has been induced to offer violence to Lady Colebrooke, on the re presentation of Mrs. Taafe, that her children were forcible withheld from her, and that they only wanted an opportunity to rush into the arms of their parent. He went to Hampstead and found the Defendant, Parish, who was procured with other to protect Mrs. Taafe against the insolence of Lady Colebrook servants. He found one of the Defendants had pistols, and in sisted on looking at them. They were not loaded. He then wen in a coach with Mrs. Taafe and her party, and drew across the road to prevent Lady Colebrook's carriage from passing. When they opened the doors he found the young Ladies did not fly t their mother as he had been instructed to expect, and in conse quence of that circumstance he endeavoured all he could t protect Lady Colebrook and the Ladies in the carriage. Mr Boltby disclaimed any motive but that of assisting a mothe whom he considered desirous of seeing her children.

Parish put in no affidavit.


The last Will and Testament of Dame Mary Colebrooke of Bath, Widow of Sir George Colebrooke, Bart. Deceased. I desire that my body may be deposited in the family Mausoleum at Chilham in Kent near the remains of my late beloved husband.

I give, devise and bequeath my freehold house situated in

Marlborough Buildings in Bath and the coach house and stables near there and all other my freehold, copyhold and leasehold Estates whatsoever situate in Great Britain to sell and dispose them after my decease either in public auction or private contract be applied to my personal estate. I bequeathed all my negroes, slaves, cattle live or dead stock and all stores and personal estate at my Estate in the island of Antigua in the West Indies and all the Sugar and produce which shall arise from there to my children and grandchildren.

Charles Daubeny who lent Sir George Colebrooke £800 in 1792 to complete his purchase of 31 Marlborough Buildings



Charles was the second son of George Daubeny, a Bristol merchant. He was baptized 16 August 1745, educated at a private school at Philip's Norton, and sent when 15 years old to Winchester College. Shortly after his admission he fell ill, was incapacitated for more than a year, and never entirely recovered. He became head boy of the school, and at age 18 gained an exhibition at New College, Oxford, where he later became a Fellow.


Coming of age, his father having died, he inherited a fortune, but the state of his health constrained him. In 1770 he went abroad to the German mineral springs and the following year visited St. Petersburg. On his return to England in 1772 he resided for some months at Oxford to prepare for holy orders, a necessary qualification to his admission to a fellowship at Winchester College. He was ordained deacon in 1773 by the Bishop of Oxford, and priest in the following week by Richard Terrick, bishop of London, and in the same year graduated B.C.L. He obtained his fellowship in 1774, but only held it for two years, when the college living of North Bradley, Wiltshire, was offered him. This living was poor, and the parish neglected. He now married a Miss Barnston, and until his vicarage could be made habitable lived at Clifton. He set about restoring his church. In 1784 he was appointed to the prebend of Minor Pars Altaris in Salisbury Cathedral, and four years later published his first work, 'Lectures on the Church Catechism. For the two following years Daubeny resided abroad and was at Versailles on the outbreak of the French Revolution. In 1790 his health was weak and he wintered in Bath, Somerset and while there interested himself in promoting the erection of a free church. His first sermon in aid of this object produced over £1,200. Christ Church, Bath was opened in 1798, and was the first free and open church in the country and he became the first minister.

Christ Church stands today a short distance from Marlborough Buildings. He must have been a good friend of Sir George Colebrooke in assisting him in the purchase of his house by lending him the £900. Both Gentlemen at the time were residing in the Royal Crescent. It was only to be for a year as Sir George was to borrow a larger amount from Arthur Jones, a woollen Draper and repay Daubeny.

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

Hastings Elwin (1776 – 1852)



Although I had researched 31 Marlborough Buildings from every angle possible and built up a list of occupiers of the house, I was completely unaware of who the owners were. Fortunately, I was given the original Deeds from the previous owner. These were a revelation and an insight into its history. The most amazing documents were those relating to Hastings Elwin who was to own the property for nearly 10 years, without actually living there. During this time it was Samuel Lane who appeared with his family as living at the address and paying rent to Hastings Elwin. The first large document that I have is in 1821 when Hastings pays £1775 to Sir James and Henry Colebrooke, surviving sons and trustees of Sir George Colebrooke. There may well have been a link between the two families as both had fortunes originating in plantations in Antigua. Although Hastings owned the house, he only lived just a short distance away in St. James Square for in 1830 he sold it to Mrs Mary Jane Marlow, Widow of Michael Marlow, who had been Vice Chancellor of Oxford University for £1770. This coincided with his marriage to Mary Anne Cole in 1829 and their moving from Bath to the Isle of Wight and eventually New South Wales in Australia where he was a member of Legislative Council from 1843 to 1844, during which time he was also Chairman of Committees. Elwin died at Camperdown in 1852.

His main claim to fame is the establishment of the Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institution in 1825 which is still to be found today in Queens Square. 


He moved to Bath in 1815 where he joined the "Bath and West of England Agricultural Society". He continues to appear on the list for 1820, when he is listed as a Vice President and his last entry is in that for 1832. In 1820 he published a pamphlet for the creation of a Literary and Scientific Institution for the city of Bath. It coincided with the destruction in December of that year of the former Lower Assembly Rooms. He with others were to use the site for a new Library and museum to be operated by the Society. This opened in 1825 with an inaugural lecture and dinner. Hastings Elwins important part in establishing the museum resulted in the Institution paying for a statue of him, which can still be seen today. It reads as follows: "The subscribers, deeply sensitive of their obligations to Mr. HASTINGS ELWIN, whose sound judgement, ardent zeal, and unremitting exertions, have been so conspicuously displayed in establishing this Institution, are anxious to evince their gratitude for his eminent services by a suitable". It is quite exiting to think that this chapter of his fulfilling life should be spent during the time that he owned 31 Marlborough Buildings.

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Samuel Lane - Collector of Taxes at Kings Lynn - whose family were to rent 31 Marlborough Buildings from 1817 until 1867

Samuel Lane first appears in the Rates List for Marlborough Buildings in 1817 with the owner, Lady Colebrooke, the widow of Sir George. Her Will issued the following year shows her wishing to sell her freehold house and it is Samuel who is to buy it from the Estate. He would have been sixty nine years of age at the time and his wife,Elizabeth, sixty five. This was obviously to be their retirement home after a life mainly spent in Kings Lynn in Norfolk. He had been Collector of Takes for the town and had obviously done well in this position. He and his family held important positions there and were well regarded. His son, Frederick was Town Clerk and son in law, William Swatman it's Mayor. His office would have been in the fine Customs House which still stands in the harbour. There is still much to find out about this gentleman and it is interesting that amongst the properties he owned was Hunstanton Lighthouse which he leased to the Crown. Whilst living in Bath he was to lose his third daughter, Isabella who was just seven years of age when she died in Bath in 1826. Elizabeth, his wife was to leave him a widower in 1832 and he himself passed away in 1835. By a strange coincidence, his daughter, Anna who had married Lieutenant Colonel George Bourne in Bath in 1825, was to later purchase the house in 1848 as a widow.







Samuel Lane Junior was the son of Samuel and Elizabeth Lane, he was born at Kings Lynn on 26 July 1780. After a childhood accident he became deaf and partially dumb. He studied under Joseph Farrington and then under Sir Thomas Lawrence who employed him as assistant. Lane first exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1804, secured a large practice, and was a constant contributor for more than fifty years, sending in all 217 works. He lived in London at 60 Greek Street, Soho until 1853, and then retired to Ipswich; he sent his last contribution to the Academy in 1857. He died at Ipswich on 29 July 1859. Amongst his many paintings is this one of Horatio Nelson painted in 1808





We have heard with sincere regret of a serious accident which has occurred to Frederick Lane, Esq., the Town Clerk of the borough of Lynn, and a family party travelling with him in Switzerland. The party were on their route homewards, and had reached Tavannes, in the neighbourhood of Basle, where they lodged for the night. The inn was entirely built of wood, and at midnight a fire broke out which speedily consumed the building. 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

Michael Marlow (1757 - 1828) was an academic administrator at the University of Oxford and an Anglican Priest.

Michael Marlow was the only son of Rev. Michael Marlow and his wife Sarah. He was educated at Merchant Taylor's School, from where he gained a scholarship to St, John's College Oxford.

Marlow subsequently became a Fellow of St John's College. In 1795, after gaining his Doctor of Divinity, he was elected President of the College. While President at St John's College, Marlow was later Vice Chancellor of Oxford University from 1798 until 1802. Marlow was also Rector at the village of Hanborough in Oxfordshire near Oxford. He was Canon of Canterbury from 1808 until his death in 1828. He married Mary Jane Clare in 1798. She was the daughter of Rev. Thomas Clare, D.D. of Rugby, Warwickshire. They did not have any children. After his death his wife lived at 20 Park Street in Bath in 1830 before moving to 31 Marlborough Buildings in 1837.

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



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Anna Bourne, daughter of Samuel Lane.

Anna was born in 1786 to Samuel and Elizabeth Lane. Her father was a Tax Collector in the port of Kings Lynn in Norfolk. She was one of six children that they bought up. After a successful career her father retired to Bath and in 1817 was living at 32 Marlborough Buildings with his wife and daughters. It was whilst there that her sister, Isabella died, aged just 37. It was whilst there in 1825 she met and married Lieutenant Colonel George Bourne, who was residing at the Circus in Bath at the time. Sadly, he was to die in 1835, the same year as her father, Samuel who had by then returned back to Kings Lynn. On the death of Jane Marlow in 1848, her house and contents are auctioned soon after. By a strange coincidence, Anna now a widow aged 62 purchases 31 Marlborough Buildings, which must have bought make happier memories of her earlier times there with her family. She was to spend the next twenty years there with her young servants. She died in 1869, aged 82 childless and her Estate passed to her nephew Frederick William Littlestone Lane and her sister, Harriett Hammond who was living with her at the time. She was buried in an impressive tomb in the graveyard of Priston Church, near Bath where her sister, Harriett was the wife of the Rev. John Hammond. Her sister was to live on until 1792, aged 89 and is buried along side her.





Henry Holland Burne, A wealthy Solicitor living at 31 Marlborough Buildings from 1869 until 1884


Mr. Henry Holland Burne, who died at 28 Marlborough Buildings on Saturday night, was one of the oldest residents of Bath, and for along while practised as a solicitor in the city where he was known as an extremely Clever lawyer. He had reached the good old age of 81. Mr. Burne was deeply attached to his nature city, for he was the son of Mr. John Burne, M.D., who was a leading physician in Bath for considerable period, living at 38, Brock Street Mr. Burne qualified as a solicitor early in life and after spending some rears in London, returned to Bath as partner in the firm of Dowding Bros, and Burne, whose offices were at 14, The Vineyards. Then the firm migrated to 37. Gay Street where its business has been 37. Gay Street, where its business has been transacted until the present day the professional successors of the original firm being Messrs. Macdonald and Longrigg Messrs. and E. Dowding passing away Mr. Burne conducted the business alone for some time and then he was joined Br E Rooke. At Christmas, 1885, Mr. Burne retired. He was a member of the Incorporated Law Society and President of the branch for many years. He became a Trustee of the Blue Coat School in 1860 and in 1898 it's Treasurer. Mr. Burne became a Governor of the Royal Mineral Water Hospital in 1878. When the Volunteer corps was inaugurated in 1859 Mr. Burne was an enthusiastic supporter of the patriotic movement and was given the commission as Captain of one of the original Bath Companies of Somerset Rifles. He was one of the original members of the Bath and County Club and his death leaves Mr. Henry Tugwell as the only survivor of those who founded the institution. He was a director of the London and Provincial Insurance Society. Comparatively late in life Mr. Burne followed the hounds a good deal and was a member of the Duke of Beaufort's Hunt. The deceased was a staunch Conservative and a generous subscriber to the party funds in Bath. It should be mentioned that he was a Trustee of Beckers Charity, one of the oldest of Baths charitable organisations. At one time he belonged to the committee of the Royal Victoria Park and strongly advocated the making of a new entrance into Park Lane, but his colleagues failed to see eye to eye with him over the proposal, and Mr. Burne resigned from the Committee. For several years Mr. Burne had a London residence in Buckingham Gate and used to spend a good deal of time in town. His wife died about 20 years ago. She was the daughter of the late General Sir Richard England. KCB, and married Mr. Burne as her second husband. Mr. Hawkins having been her first. There was no children of the Marriage. Mr. Burne leaves an elder brother, the Rev. J.B. Burne, Recyor if Aldermaston, in Berkshire, and a sister, Mrs Margaretta Burne, who married her cousin, and whose son wedded the daughter of the Rev. J.B. Burne. The deceased owned considerable house properties and he was one of the wealthiest residents of Bath leaving an estate of £215,000


Catherine Monkland was born in 1817 in the village of Box in Wiltshire. In 1846 she married John Charlewood at St. Swithins Church in Walcot in Bath. He was a Major in the Army. In 1881 they were living at The Elms in Alveston in Glos. Their daughter, Catherine had been born in Boldre in Hampshire in 1848 and in 1874 she married Frederick James Phillip Caldecot in the village of Alveston. Resworn £16141 18s. 6d. Frederick William Grafton (1816 - 27 January 1890) was a British industrialist and Liberal politician.

He was the eldest son of Joseph Smith Grafton, a Manchester merchant. Following a private education he obtained employment at a <u>calico</u> printing works. He subsequently established his own calico printing business, F.W. Grafton and Company, with premises in at Broad Oak Works, |Accrington and Manchester. He was a major employer in the area and was selected as a parliamentary candidate by the Liberal Party at the 1880 General Election. He was felt to represent the "commercial class" and was elected to represent North East Lancashire along with Lord Hartington.

When the North East Lancashire seat was split into four divisions by the Redistribution of Sales Act 1885, Grafton was chosen to contest the new Accrington constituency. Although elected as a Liberal, he voted against the government's First Home Rule Bill and joined the Unionist Party. The rejection of the bill led to the dissolution of parliament, and Grafton announced that he would not be standing due to ill health. Grafton lived at Heysham Hall, Lancaster and Hope Hall, Manchester.He married Emily Sophia Howard in 1850. Frederick Grafton died at his London residence, 7 Kensington Palace Gardens in January 1890, aged 74.



Selman was well over on his left hand side, and witness, as soon as he saw him, pulled further over-almost across the white ling-on the Devizes Road to allow the motor-cyclist plenty of room to pass.

Selman seemed to come straight for the car, witness said, and never slackened speed. He appeared to be trying to cross in front of the car, as though he thought it was going towards London. Witness gave a hand signal as he approached the fork.

Questioned by the Coroner, witness said he estimated that three-quarters of the road was available to the motorcyclist, and it appeared that he could easily have turned and gone behind the car.

Answering Mr. Taylor, he said the front whee' of the motor-cycle collided with the bumper bar of the car, just in front of the near side headlight. Selman was thrown over the bonnet, and the motor-cycle rebounded from the car. Witness could not say whether Selman saw his hand signal. When the impact occurred the car had finished crossing the London-Bath road.

The Coroner entered a verdict that death was due to toxæmia resulting from the accidental collision.


